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MAKING 10

The number 10 can be made in lots of different ways. Imagine that each different 'big fish' colour is a number from 1 to 4.

1 + 2 + 3 + 4 = 10

We can use Play-Doh colours to make 10. Use this:

1 + 2 + 2 + 2 + 3 = 10

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No Cook Modelling Dough Recipe

You will need:

- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp oil
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 cups water
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1/2 cup vinegar

Method:

1. Mix the flour, salt, and oil together in a mixing bowl.
2. Add the water, oil, and vinegar to the mixture. Mix well.
3. Knead the dough until it is smooth and elastic. You can use a rolling pin to flatten the dough.
4. Roll the dough into a thin sheet. You can use a rolling pin to flatten the dough.
